DIGDEEPER

November 22, 2015 Ephesians 2:11-22 and 1 Corinthians 1:10-17 (<u>Listen</u>) Dr. Richard Rogers

THE BIG IDEA

Our sin nature inevitably leads us to separate from others in a variety of ways, but the New Testament is clear that this should not be the way of Christians. We should instead be people marked by a joy in Jesus that propels us in love toward those who don't look or act like us— both within and without the church. This work of bridge building is our only hope of reaching our world for Christ.

START A CONVERSATION (Use this to begin a Conversation that Matters with your kids, coworkers, spouse, or someone in line at the grocery store. Then, <u>tell us about it</u>.)

Do you go to church somewhere? If so, what is God doing in your church?

SOME THINGS TO THINK ABOUT

- We looked at the words of Paul to the Corinthian church in 1 Corinthians 1:10-17. Richard noted that the divisions in the Corinthian church were keeping them from their mission. What is the mission of the church at large? Why does it exist?
- What things are essential to Christianity that we cannot yield on? What things are nonessential and open to disagreement among Christians?
- In what way(s) do you come to church each week expecting to be served or accommodated? Do you belong to a "group" that you expect to be recognized or honored in a particular way?
- Which grouping in the church (young families, students, senior adults, etc) do you feel most distant from and why? What would begin to close that gap?

GO DEEPER

- Stephen Nichols is the president of Reformation Bible College and hosts a weekly podcast called *5 Minutes in Church History*. In one episode from earlier this year, he attempted to summarize <u>all of church history in five minutes</u>. There's a lot packed it a few minutes, but it's a great summary of the pathway that led to various church divisions.
