THE BIG IDEA

The message of our redemption by a sovereign God must be shared with the world through the church. But it will not be heard clearly if we continue dividing ourselves along racial lines that devastate us and others. We must remind ourselves that we were at one time outside of the family of God, thank him for calling us in, and then go share this hope with others—regardless of their skin color. This is how the whole world will hear of our great God.

START A CONVERSATION (Use this to begin a Conversation that Matters with your kids, coworkers, spouse, or someone in line at the grocery store. Then, tell us about it.)

What do people with different skin colors have in common with one another?

SOME THINGS TO THINK ABOUT

- In Ephesians 2:11-12, Paul divides all of mankind into two groups. What are the groups, and which one do you belong to? What implications does being in that group have on how you treat people who are different from you today?
- Think of your very best friends. What race, age, and socioeconomic status are they? What about your life makes it this way?
- When you think of the issue of race, do your habits and views look any different than the unbeliever who lives down the street? How so?
- Who were the last three people you shared the gospel with? In what ways were they like you, and in what ways were they different?

GO DEEPER

- Thabiti Anyabwile explains <u>how and why the roots of racism run so deeply</u> in our culture. He shows why we must dig deep in our souls to eradicate its poisonous root.
- Racism is favoritism. According to James, favoritism is sin and has no place in the church.

- In a majority white church, we need to be reminded that normal Christianity isn't white.
